## From the Pastor's Desk

Then, all the snow melts in what seemed like a few hours, only to wake up the next day to more! Holy Smokes – Just make up your mind already!!!

I heard once or twice since I've been here, that if you don't like the weather, just wait ten minutes. Sometimes, it sure seems that way!

Being a Pastor is sometimes just like the weather in North West Montana! Things can - and do - change in a moment!

Just look at what has gone on in our congregation in the last couple of months!!! It seems that it has been one thing after another! And occasionally, I just want to throw up my arms and say ENOUGH!!

During these times, I sometimes get pretty discouraged. Especially when I look at what is going on in the world around us, and I see that same stuff sneak into our ranks here at Stillwater!

I wonder to myself – what is going on here?? But we are told by both Jesus and Paul that wolves will come in among us, and cause havoc!

It is during these discouraging times that I praise God for the Deacons board holding me up in prayer, and some very good friends who help me stay grounded in reality, and of course for my wonderful wife and best friend who not only prays for me and keeps me grounded but she also reminds me that we are all sinners, saved by the marvelous Grace of Jesus Christ, and because of that we all need to give grace to each other.

Thinking about the work of God and our congregation, have you ever noticed that we sometimes but heads and have friction with our fellow Christians? Did you know that there are numerous passages in the Scriptures detailing how we are to treat each other? I think we all have a favorite that we turn to when conflict arises.

With the stresses of the world, and all we have going on at Stillwater, I thought, I would share my favorite.

Paul tells us in Romans 12:18 – If it is possible, as far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone.

This verse is in the middle of Paul's discussion on Christian living. He tells us first of all to not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is--his good, pleasing, and perfect will.

Too often the world around us lures us away from God – but Paul tells us to renew our mind – Go back to the teachings we know are true! Go back to the basics!

Then as he is talking about the Christian life, he gives a list of things to do in verses 9 through 16. These verses are focused on how we are to treat each other. Unfortunately, we seem to fail way too often, so Paul tells us what to do in verse 17 – Don't repay evil with Evil!

It is in the conclusion of this list that my favorite is given - live in peace — if at all possible, as much as depends on you.

Notice how Paul puts this. We are to do what we can to live in peace – this is not dependent on what others do – but as much as we can do!

And, as I was looking at this verse, and doing some studying, it seems that all the New Testament writers have something to say about the way we treat each other.

That made me wonder why God saw fit to tell us how to treat our neighbor so often?

The answer is so obvious that it almost slapped me square in the face! He tells us so often, in so many different ways – because we screw it up so often!

So, as we look ahead to a new month of ministry – let's remember we are all in this together! We are all Sinners, saved by the wonderful, marvelous Grace of God! So, let us serve each other and our community – for the Glory of God!

# CHEESY CREAMY SCALLOPED POTATOES

Cheesy white sauce:

3 TBSP Butter

3 TBSP Flour

1 tsp Salt

½ tsp pepper

2 (12 oz.) Evaporated Milk (3 Cups)

(Evaporated milk substitute: 2¼ cup whole milk and ¾ cup half-and-half). Heat 3 tablespoons butter in saucepan over low heat until melted. Blend in flour, salt and pepper. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture is smooth and bubbly; stir in milk, garlic and onion. Cook on low for 5 minutes. Add cheese, heating until melted.

#### Potatoes and assembly:

2 Pounds Red Potatoes (6 medium) raw, thinly sliced 1 TBSP Butter 1/4-1/2 Cup (1-2 oz.) Shredded Cheddar Cheese

Layer sliced potatoes in greased 2-quart casserole dish in several layers, topping each layer with cheesy white sauce. Dot with 1 tablespoon butter and sprinkle with remaining cheese. Cover and bake

at 350° for 40 minutes. Uncover and finish baking 60-70 minutes longer.

Unfortunately, one of the only absolute constants for everyone is sin, no matter how hard we try, including even becoming a youth pastor, so you don't do it anymore, we all struggle with and commit sins daily. ## Building Project Report

The council decided to dissolve the building committee at the February 18 meeting. This committee was formed in accordance with the congregation procedure manual for the purpose of developing and overseeing a building plan to construct an activity center. Since the plan was designed and approved by the congregation and has been under construction since October 2019 it is no longer necessary for this committee to exist. I will continue to provide project updates in the monthly newsletters and by other media means available like texts, email, and the like. Any major project issues that might arise will be brought to the council for resolution. Congregation members should feel free to contact me at any time with project related questions or issues.

In last month's newsletter I reported a 2021 fundraising plan was being developed. I am now expanding that to include a construction plan which will allow our contractors to schedule and prioritize work as funds become available. For example, the insulation of all exterior walls was recently completed. Drywall, tape, texture, and painting has begun in the restrooms and will continue into the two offices, coatroom, and storage room on the East side of the building. The plan is to complete the restrooms by Easter April 4. Work on the septic system will resume when weather permits.

The (7) remaining doors have been ordered as has been (2) 4 ft. X 6 ft. mission signs. A donor is covering the cost of the signs which will be installed on each end of the activity center. The estimated cost of the inside work described above is approximately \$110,000, and the funds are available. I am meeting with Mark Van Derveer from Kalispell Electric to review the estimated electrical trim-out costs. The restroom electrical work is already included in Matt's estimate.

Other issues such as acoustical sound boards, wall carpets, floor striping and the like will be addressed as we move forward. Thank you for your continued support and prayers. As we enter this Lenten season may we give God the glory and praise for His many blessings that have made this project possible.
