From the Pastor's Desk

As we enter into May, we all start thinking about summer, and the activities that are going to take place, and most of all, we start thinking about the warmth and sun!

With that thought in mind - I want to encourage you to also remember the Son!

Let's face it - we are all busy, and all too often, we allow our busy schedules to take president over our Lord and Savior.

We are reminded multiple times in the Bible that that is exactly what happened to the Nation of Israel - multiple times - and as a result they were carried off into captivity.

The Prophet Jeremiah pleaded with the nation to turn from their wicked ways - or they were going to reap what they sowed!

And it wasn't as if a light switch was flipped. No - there was a gradual, and steady movement away from the teachings of God!

In fact, the people thought they were doing great!

But we know that wasn't the case! And if we take an honest look around us, I wonder how many people think they are doing just great - but are really walking that wide smooth road that leads to damnation?

Jeremiah pleaded with the people of Israel, and he pleads with us today: Thus says the Lord: Stand by the crossroads, and look, and ask for the old paths, where the good way is; and walk in it, and find rest for your souls." But they said, "We will not walk in it." (Jer. 6:16).

Several important truths come from this exhortation.

The first thing to note is "Thus says the Lord." This means we

1) Listen, which reflects a belief that God communicates with us. If we want to know God's will for our life or in a particular situation, first we need to believe God is willing and able to communicate with us. God's will speak to us through the Bible, prayer, other people, even through God's creation. In Jeremiah, "Thus says the Lord," announces to us that what follows is very important for us to hear.

2) Stand implies we Stop and reflect. Most accidents that happen at intersections occur because someone is speeding or fails to stop at a red light. In the city, the joke is: Green means go, yellow means go faster, and red means proceed with caution.

When we find ourselves at a crossroads, we are at a place of decision, a moment when our future will be shaped by the direction in which we go. When we're at crossroads the thing to do is to stop and reflect and not to rush forward as fast as we can.

- 3) Looking implies Gathering Information. God says when we're at the crossroads we are to look as far as we can down the different roads which is a way of saying, we are to gather as much information as we can about the consequences of our decision. "The road is wet, there is a car coming quickly, I wonder what will happen if I pull out in front of it?" What are the likely results of going in each direction we might take? What will I think about this ten or even twenty years from now? Often times we don't look far enough down the road before we make a decision. Sometimes we cannot foresee all the possibilities, opportunities, or dangers that a certain way holds for us. That is why the next step is vital.
- 4) Ask for the ancient paths where the good way lies. Looking implies our action; we are doing the looking and using our powers of vision and discernment to help ourselves. Asking means seeking direction and guidance. Asking implies we are going beyond our own abilities, seeking the Lord's guidance. Asking implies we are humble enough to recognize there is wisdom beyond ourselves in God and in other people that may benefit us as we seek God's will for our lives. Sometimes we can stubbornly persist in going in a certain direction no matter what because we're so sure we're right, and we don't listen to God or anyone else.
- 5) While we live in a culture that worships at the altar of the new, the latest, and the cutting edge, Jeremiah invites us to ask for the ancient paths where the good way lies. The good way is not one that is hidden or obscured although it may not always be easy.

It wasn't easy for Jeremiah. The message God gave him to preach was a hard one that condemned religious and political leaders as well as the people for their disobedience, corruption, and worship of other gods.

Jeremiah struggled with God, cried all the time, was put on trial by his people, had the scrolls with his prophetic words burned, and he endured opposition right up to the end of his life.

Jesus even tells us (Matthew 7:13-14): Enter through the narrow gate; for the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction, and there are many who take it. For the gate is narrow & the road is hard that leads to life, and there are few who find it.

- 6) God tells us Ask for the ancient paths where the good way lies and "Walk in it." Once we have looked and listened and received instruction and guidance then it is up to us to Take action, to take responsibility for the direction of our life. Jeremiah reminds us of our own responsibility for our fate. He warns the people of his time and they refuse to listen. They looked to blame their enemies, God, even the prophet himself, anyone but themselves. Unwilling to hear, they were heading toward catastrophe.
- 7) The Result of listening to the Lord, standing and reflecting, looking and gathering information, asking for direction and guidance, and then taking action is when we will "Find rest for our souls." This is similar to when Jesus invites us to himself saying, "Come to me, all you that are weary and carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me; for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

Sadly, Jeremiah's people would not follow this advice and they paid dearly for taking the wrong path at the crossroads. God knows we all take wrong turns. We end up at dead ends or in a bad part of town and wonder how we got there or if we'll ever get out. God's grace is so great - that even when we are disobedient, God keeps trying to speak to us and to direct us on the right path!

When God's people failed to listen, God ultimately sent Jesus to make the way plain. Jesus called people who didn't follow God's ancient, good path "lost." Jesus came to seek and to save the lost. He came to help us find and stay on God's good path that leads to joy and abundant life.

It seems to me you can tell by the way people are living that many are unsure of where they are going or don't know where they want to go; that they are in several senses of the word, lost. Many people seem to be accelerating down the road to nowhere at faster and faster speeds,

forgetting that if we're lost, going faster only gets us further away from where we need to be.

It has always been and always will be the role of Christians and churches to help those who are lost to find their way to Jesus and life. Those of us who are unsure of what God wants us to do, those of us who are unsure which road to take, may need to humble ourselves and stop and ask God for directions.

God will not send us in the wrong direction!

Do you know where you're going? Where do you want to go?

As we enter into spring - let's not forget to keep Jesus as a guiding light!

The Youth are committed to serve the community through our strength in Jesus Christ.

Welcome to the beautiful month of May everybody, glad you could join me (unless you haven't turned your calendar). I was just in North Dakota, or as some call it the promised land, about a week ago, and instead of milk and honey, they got snow and snow. After having to snowshoe to my parents igloo, I was very thankful for this tropical Kalispell weather! Not only does the weather always get nicer in May, but there's always so many fun holidays for everyone – Mother's Day, Memorial Day, Star Wars Day (May the fourth be with you), and the day where they celebrate all the sinkholes (Sinkhole De Mayo). Times are obviously busy, but when we think about it, aren't all times busy. Certain aspects of a "full plate" can go in waves, but as people in society and community, there's always something going on. I have talked about this a lot in previous newsletters and sermons, but lately I have felt a spiritual conviction of lacking devotion time, and more often than not, I blame "busyness" for that. Building Committee Report

Matt's work on the North Drive-Thru Portico has now been completed. When weather permits Hagestad will paint the rafters white to match the Eastside entry. He has been swamped with work so not sure when this will happen. The rain gutters have now been installed. Kalispell Electric will install the lights after the painting is completed. The acoustical ceiling panels for the activity center have been ordered, 28 in number, 4 ft. by 8 ft. by 2 inch in size. The lead time for delivery is 3-4 weeks. Matt will install these. Rachel has samples of the EcoCore insulation and the DMD khaki2 color fabric that the panels will be wrapped in.

Matt's latest estimate for constructing the patio roof is \$ 100K. The cost of materials has increased dramatically, some as much as double and triple since his original estimate of two years ago. The funds have been promised for this last phase of the building project! He is not sure when he can begin work because of his present workload and the fact that he has recently lost two of his crew. Matt's estimate does not include Kalispell Electric estimate which was \$ 5,019.00 in March 2020. I am sure with increased material costs this estimate has increased also. We can reduce these overall expenses if Rick Martinez and his volunteers are available and willing to install the metal roofing. As always thanks for your prayers and support and feel free to contact me with questions or concerns relating to our building project.
