From the Pastor's Desk

I have heard it said that February is the month of Love.

Heart shaped boxes full of chocolate and the bright flower bouquets are out on display in almost every store.

People are seeking that special little token that says "I Love You", and there is a lot of planning going on for the perfect presentation to show that special someone just how much you love them.

And all this is because of Valentine's Day. That one special day where you show that special person how much you care!

But what about the other 364 days?

I heard a story once, how one husband neglected to give his wife a card on Valentine's Day, so he wrote her a letter and explained that he loved her every day so how could he possibly remember one day over another – because they were all Valentines days to him.

Makes a good point, doesn't it?

Now, I'm definitely not opposed to Valentine's Day, but – I feel in our society today, we toss the word Love around and fill it with all kinds of nuances, and meanings that can really confuse.

For example, we say: I love my cat. I love to play the drums. I love sunny days. I love my new phone. I love your outfit. I love my job (well, maybe only some of us!) and we know that we don't mean the same for each of those statements!

It seems to me that either the English language lacks suitable alternatives to convey our warm sentiments or maybe we have just developed an emotional addiction to the word love.

If love were a person, she must be exhausted! She should go on strike until we understand better when to call her into service.

But, no matter, because love is a versatile word.

Sadly, most people have absolutely no idea what love is, how it looks, or even how it's supposed to act.

When I mention "Love" to people, I am usually directed to one of the most popular Scripture verses in the Bible. No Not John 3:16! I'm thinking of 1 Corinthians 13. Sometimes known as the "Love Chapter." And it is indeed a wonderful chapter describing and defining Love!

But I often wonder if people really understand the implications that Paul is presenting in this text. Every thing Paul uses to define Love is a verb, or a word that denotes action on the one giving the Love to another!

Unfortunately, over the last 50 years or so, love has lost the idea of action, and become more of a feeling. People are operating on the assumption that love is some mysterious, nebulous thing that just happens and will just magically manifest itself over your life and your emotions, and you will have no control in the matter!

Did you know that the number one reason cited for divorce today is "I just don't love him/her anymore." This statement is often accompanied by a sigh and a shake of the head as though the speaker can't understand how it could have happened. That mystical feeling must have just evaporated!

God, on the other hand, gives a very different picture of love. He brings love alive for us. He puts it into action!

Jesus tells us in John 15:13 – Greater love has no one than this: to lay down one's life for one's friends. Then He goes on to call us His friends!

And then, probably my absolute favorite Bible verse on Love – Romans 5:8 - but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners, Christ died for us.

This verse basically tells us that Jesus as our friend, gave up His life for us on the cross, while we were in the very act of sinning against Him! WOW – now that's LOVE!!

And in 1 John 4:7-8 we learn that love comes from God because God is himself love.

Oddly enough, even Christians have somehow bought into the idea that love is only a warm fuzzy feeling. But love is not just a feeling. It's a choice.

And if it is a choice then you must choose to do something, and sometimes even NOT do something.

Looking at probably the greatest verse on Love in all the Bible – John 3:16 – For God So LOVED the World that He GAVE His only Begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life.

God shows that Love is a choice! And, by understanding the nature of love and then choosing to operate in it we declare ourselves as followers of Christ.

It isn't the t-shirt we wear or the little fish on our cars. They'll know us by our love. Jesus said, "By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." (John 13:35)

From a distance, we might look like anyone else. But upon closer inspection, we should find the fruit of the Spirit as evidence of our experience.

In Galatians 5:22 we read, the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

The fact the scriptures likens these attributes to fruit indicates they can be cultivated, or grown. So, as we grow in Christ, the fruit of the Spirit grows in us. Or, at least it should.

So, as we focus on Love this month of LOVE, lets also focus on growing some Fruit, so others will see that we belong to Christ!

Fighting "Flashy" Things

Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old they will not turn from it. <u>Proverbs 22:6</u>

In the 1960s-era TV series *The Andy Griffith Show*, a man tells Andy he should let his son Opie decide how he wants to live. Andy disagrees: "You can't let a young'un decide for himself. He'll grab at the first flashy thing with shiny ribbons on it. Then, when he finds out there's a hook in it, it's too late. Wrong ideas come packaged with so much glitter that it's hard to convince them that other things might be better in the long run." He concludes that it's important for parents to model right behavior and help "keep temptation away."

Andy's words are related to the wisdom found in Proverbs: "Start children off on the way they should go, and even when they are old they will not turn from it" (22:6). Although many may read these words as a promise, they're really a guide. All of us are called to make our own decision to believe in Jesus. But we can help lay a biblical foundation through our love for God and Scripture. And we can pray that as the little ones under our care mature, they choose to receive Christ as Savior and walk in His ways and *not* "in the paths of the wicked" (v. 5).

Our own victory over "flashy things" through the Holy Spirit's enabling is also powerful testimony. Jesus' Spirit helps us to withstand temptation and molds our lives into examples worth imitating.

SCRIPTURE INSIGHT

The book of Proverbs frequently emphasizes the importance of adults providing wise guidance and discipline for children. In Proverbs 29, parents are warned that "a child left undisciplined disgraces its mother" (v. 15), but if they discipline their children, "they will give you peace; they will bring you the delights you desire" (v. 17). But these general principles on the wisdom and necessity of adults providing children guidance don't imply that parents carry all the responsibility for their children's choices. Other sections of the book nuance the picture. Proverbs is addressed to the young (1:4–7), emphasizing the importance of every person choosing to humbly listen to the voice of wisdom (v. 20; 2:2–5) and to rely on God for the wisdom only found in Him (2:5–6). Ironically, the man who wrote those words, Solomon, would stray from the paths of wisdom as an adult (1 Kings 11:9–11).

I can't answer for everyone else, but people as a whole, crave attention and care, and are so comforted by the fact that there is someone out there who loves us.
