From the Pastor's Desk

Giving Glory to God

As spring SLOWLY creeps into the flathead, thoughts of summer and summer activities start to move to the front.

And as we think about getting back outdoors, into Gods Great creation, I can't help but Praise God and Give glory to Him at what He has given to us!

Just look around – and you see the absolute Glory of God in all this creation!

And as we think about giving Glory to God, have you ever thought what it actually means for us to Glorify Him?

In the Gospel of John, Jesus, explains very explicitly, and tells us in practical terms how to give Glory to God.

In His High Priestly prayer Jesus says (Jn 17:4-8): I have brought you glory on earth by completing the work you gave me to do. And now, Father, glorify me in your presence with the glory I had with you before the world began. "I have revealed you to those whom you gave me out of the world. They were yours; you gave them to me, and they have obeyed your word. Now they know that everything you have given me comes from you. For I gave them the words you gave me, and they accepted them. They knew with certainty that I came from you, and they believed that you sent me.

First off - note that Jesus is speaking of glorifying God on earth. This is not some mystical thing that only happens in heaven, but it actually happens here with us.

Secondly, Note the verb: completing. God is not glorified in half-done, slipshod work. Paul tells us that whatever we do – we are to do it to the Glory of God (1Cor 10:31). He means that whatever the task – we are to do it to the best of our ability, doing it for God Himself! And thirdly, it is work for God that glorifies God; the work of Christ was to reveal God to us. Our work is to reveal Christ to others!

Notice how the disciples reacted:

First, they obeyed. Obedience is the footing of faith. If you will not obey, you cannot have faith. Your pride will prevent it. Jesus says – if you love Me, you will obey what I command.

They also accepted the word. The phrase literally means to take within. The idea is that the word has become a part of them.

They also knew with certainty just who Jesus is. The foundation of all relationships is in knowing the other person.

Would you bring glory to God?

Then heed this example:

Accept and obey the word given to you.

Complete the work — whatever it is — that God has given you to the best of your ability.

Remain — with certainty — in the personal relationship you have with Jesus.

This will bring Glory to God in all you do!

Stillwater Youth Groupies

The Youth are committed to serve the community through our strength in Jesus Christ.

The months are kind of like the breakfast foods on Charlotte's plate at this point, all blending together and I'm not really sure what's what, but let's just say it's April! Normally for April Fools, I like to say that I'm pregnant (through means of Rachel of course) or that all my hair's gone gray, but at this point, both of those answers are getting too realistic, so for April Fools this year, we'll just say that I'm working! Though bad dad jokes are a gift I've been given, I love the ability to smile and laugh that God has given to all of us, don't forget to do one of those today! As I'm typing this, a couple days before April, the news of the school shooting in Nashville has just broken, and to be honest, it's gut-wrenching for several reasons. As a new parent, it is truly unimaginable and beyond heart breaking to even think about having to receive a phone call like the one those parents did. It's also very disheartening that it seems like we are becoming "numb" to these headlines due to there being so many of them. How do we deal with these things, how do we respond to true evil? This is a question that I don't truly have the answer to under my own power, but like all unanswerable questions/obstacles, the best thing we can do is look to Jesus. How did our personal Savior, who came to this sinful, broken world and bore the flesh, handle things like this? There are several examples of Jesus' responses to shocking events in the New Testament. Craig just preached on this passage last Sunday, but how about John 11, when Jesus' friend and Mary and Martha's brother, Lazarus, passed away. When Jesus arrived in Bethany, Lazarus had already passed. When the two sisters met Him outside the village, everyone was weeping and asking why this had happened and why He couldn't have come sooner. That's when the shortest verse in the Bible comes into play and gives us a glimpse into Jesus' heart of mercy. First, John says that He was overcome with emotion, and then 11:35, "Jesus wept". Our King cried, it was a heartbreaking situation and it saddened Him, but the passage doesn't stop there. Though Jesus is different than us for obvious reasons, (and this is not me saying don't try to be like Jesus), He still trusted in God. Though He wept and let the emotions come out, He did not give up, or spread hatred, He trusted in His Father, who is also our Father, to fulfill His divine plan. I believe that is one of the answers to this question I previously asked. There are many examples during Jesus' three years of ministry that we can pluck and learn from, His Father's house being turned into a market, the temptation in the desert, His own crucifixion!

Now, I am not trying to compare any of these events to another, that is not the point, the point is that evil has been around since the Fall, and unfortunately, will continue to be until Jesus' return, but out of all these examples, Jesus never responded with hate. He never threw pity parties. Jesus answered with emotion, with righteous anger, and most importantly love. When He was hanging on the cross dying in the most brutal way known to man at the time, He asked His Father to forgive the people. 1 Corinthians 13:6 says, "Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth." It is ok for us to be sad and righteously angered at this tragedy, but we need to respond in love, and love is not found in hatred, retribution, or violence. Pray for the victim's families, pray for the students, and staff that were present, lift everything up to God in prayer. Most importantly, show your neighbor love, be Jesus' light to people, you just don't know how much one person might really need it at a particular moment.

Due to the first paragraph being a longer section than normal, which I'm glad it was, I really felt the Holy Spirit lay it on my heart as I struggled with how to respond, I will give you the "movie" version of what's been going in youth group! The youth group's major event this month to finish the "late winter gauntlet" as I like to call it (I just came up with it now), was our annual lock-in! On Friday evening, March 4th through Saturday morning, March 5th, Faith Free Lutheran joined us again this year just like last year for a night of really anything but sleep. In total, there were 19 students accompanied by seven adults, counting Darryl and myself, throughout the night: praise God for awesome numbers, both student and adult-wise! Faith's youth leader, Emily Herset, graciously led us in worship early in the evening, and I gave a lesson about what faith (the gift, not their church), truly means – there may have been a diaper and a blindfold for the object portion of the lesson, but I can neither confirm nor deny, the point is they learned stuff. This year was also the first year there were no major injuries, and that one I can confirm and deny, hallelujah! I pretty much just woke up now from it, but all in all, it was an awesome time of learning and fellowship for all! In terms of regular weekly meetings, we met every Wednesday in March and averaged 9 students, we had a total of about 15 different ones, but somebody must have cooties because we can never seem to get them all together on the same night. Regular midweek 87 unleaded youth group will continue until the end of the school year which will then transform into summer group, so as always, busy times ahead, but am very excited for it!

Our youth are not immune to this evil either by any means, so please join me in prayer for them and their families as well! Prayer and showing the love of Jesus truly is one of the many things that this congregation thrives at and helps put more tushies in the seats, which means more people hearing about this perfect love, so keep it up Stillwater! Don't forget to thank Jesus either, for all the countless blessings we overlook every day! Happy April!

<u>The Secret River</u> by Kate Grenville is a historical fiction novel about "a banished English family who wrested a new life from the alien terrain of Australia and its native people" (Cannongate Publishing) "Magnificent, and sheer gorgeousness of the territory being fought over..." in speaking of the authors words. (The New Yorker)

<u>The Last Checkmate</u> by Gabriella Saab, a WW II historical fiction novel, tells the story of a young woman... who is a member of the Polish resistance in Warsaw, is captured and imprisoned in Auschwitz, and it tells of her fight to stay alive by playing chess. (Harper Collins Publisher)

The Sisters of Auschwitz by Roxane Van Iperen is a true story of two Jewish sisters' resistance in the heart of Nazi territory. "Risking arrest and death, the sisters help save others, sheltering them in the woods... but are eventually betrayed" and head to Auschwitz. "A story of heroism and moral bravery, --and a reminder of the power each of us has to change the world." (Harper Collins Publishers)

<u>The Art of Racing in the Rain</u> by Garth Stein is "a heart-wrenching but deeply funny and ultimately uplifting story of family, love, loyalty, and hope, ...as only a dog could tell it!" (Harper Collins Publishers)

<u>The Wild Inside</u> by Christine Carbo takes place one night in Glacier National Park ...when something unimaginable happened..a grizzly bear attacks the father. Twenty years later there is another similar death, and it is investigated by an agent for the Dept. of Interior. A suspenseful mystery! The 1st of 4 novels about Glacier National Park that are rated 4 ½ stars on Amazon.

<u>The Orphan's Tale</u> by Pam Jenoff is a story of a teenage girl's heroism who hides a Jewish baby while she hides out with a circus troupe during WW II.

<u>The Woman with the Blue Star</u> also by Pam Jenoff is a story of an 18 yr. old girl in 1942, who is forced to seek refuge in the sewers beneath the city. She and a young Polish girl become friends, but their friendship is threatened by the situation of the war.

Beyond All Dreams by Elizabeth Camden tells the story of a map librarian and her quest to solve the mystery of a ship that disappeared at sea. She enlists the help of Luke, a powerful congressman.

The Chase by Clive Cussler is a historical thriller. In 1906 the U.S. Govt. hires a detective (Isaac Bell) to capture a bank robber. A train engine is found in Flathead Lake, which leads Bell to travel far and wide to pursue this sociopath. This is the first of 13 books in the Isaac Bell Adventures by Cussler.


